Baking Beauties -

Mince pies was our challenge for the November meeting. A google search by Chris revealed some interesting facts. Our current day mince pies do not resemble those of the Middle Ages in either name, shape, size or filling.

In Tudor times the 'Minst pye' or 'chewet' was a symbol of the Christmas story. It's rectangular shape depicted the manger and the pastry pie top was baby Jesus. The 13 ingredients of the pie (meats, fruit and spice) represented Jesus and his disciples. The mince pie was even fit for a king. In 1413 Henry V served for his Coronation.

Moving on to the 18th century the pies took on a sweeter taste and became circular in shape. All change again in Victorian times when suet was substituted for meat.

Jonty has found an early cookbook which makes reference to mince pies of the 14th century and part of this resides in the Rylands library in Manchester. Could this be a visit for the Spring? Watch this space.
